





City Updates 5 Year Capital Improvement Program

Recently the City Manager presented to the City Commission the annual update to the City's Capital Improvement Program (CIP). The document represents an update of the CIP that was originally prepared for the five year cycle of 2003 to 2008. The update process is important for the CIP to become a continuing and ongoing planning/implementation process. The last four years of last year's program were reevaluated in light of unanticipated needs, cost revisions, new project priorities and the financial condition of the City. In addition, the CIP was updated to add new projects in the fifth year (2008/09) to complete the cycle. Projects included within the framework of the program were based on input from Commissioners, staff, City consultants and citizens.

The primary goal of the Capital Improvement Program is to develop a long - term plan of proposed capital expenditures, the means and methods of financing, and a schedule of priorities for implementation. The program forms the foundation for governmental participation in the development process and represents a commitment by the community

toward the achievement and maintenance of a desirable high quality of life.

MAJOR EMPHASIS WAS PLACED ON THE FOLLOWING PROJECTS:

- Charter Middle School
Wing Construction4,100,000
- Waterways Park Development ...4,047,000
- Transportation, Street Lighting
& Safety Improvements2,695,694
- Stormwater Drainage
Improvements1,605,000
- Citywide Beautification
Improvements265,000
- Park Maintenance Projects188,250

The proposed 2004 - 2009 Capital Improvement Program includes 24 projects in five functional categories with a total value of \$33,522,552. The following represents the percentage of total funding that each functional category has been allocated: Beautification & Parks Facilities (13%), Public Buildings and Facilities Improvements (60%), Transportation, Drainage and Infrastructure Improvements (13%), Capital Equipment Purchase and

Replacement (7%) and Information/Communication Technology (7%).

HIGHLIGHTS

- Construction of new \$4,100,000 Charter Middle School Wing Addition serving 6-8 grades on NE 188th Street.
- Development and construction of the expanded 6 acre Waterways Park facility on NE 213th Street.
- Street lighting, drainage and sidewalk improvements to NE 27th Court (Jack Smith Boulevard).
- Construction of a Cultural Arts Center to expand cultural activities for the community and enhance the quality of life for residents.
- Implementation of \$904,700 Traffic Video Monitoring Program which provided for the installation of cameras at key intersections to allow the Police Department to monitor and respond to traffic conditions.
- Utilizes a stormwater utility program to correct and improve drainage along roadways for certain areas of the City. A total of \$1,605,000 worth of improvements will be completed during the five year period.
- Implementation of \$565,000 of transportation improvements that includes citywide directional sign upgrades, street lighting for Lehman Causeway access roads and Miami Gardens Drive Extension.
- A total of \$265,000 of citywide beautification improvements including median landscaping and newspaper stands is funded to continue to fulfill our goal of being the most beautiful City in South Florida. Major improvements include: NE 207th south swale

area and William Lehman Causeway west of Country Club Drive.

- Road maintenance projects that total \$930,000 to enhance safety are included for NE 207th Street, Aventura Boulevard and Yacht Club Drive and Williams Island Road.
- Provides the necessary equipment to continue to provide high quality and effective police services.
- Continues the implementation of technology improvements and management information systems to enhance the productivity and efficiency of city operations.
- Ensures that the tools of production, vehicles, equipment and technology, are available for city operations.

The following represents the significant revisions or modifications to the proposed CIP compared to the prior document:

- NE 27th Court (Jack Smith Blvd) Improvements –\$495,994.
- Added Miami Gardens Drive Extension Upgrades –\$225,000.
- Added Lehman Causeway Service Road Street Lights – \$165,000.
- Added Lehman Causeway Beautification (west)- \$150,000.
- Added Directional Sign Upgrades Citywide – \$100,000.

The CIP is an important tool that provides a business plan for the City to fund and implement needed citywide improvements in a financially prudent manner. Copies of the CIP are available from the City Manager's Office (305-466-8910). 📞




URGENT: Change in Polling Place for Precinct 103

RadKIDS Program

Aventura Police Department recently completed its first radKIDS Program (Resisting aggression defensively) for 13 children ages 5 to 7. The Program is an educational opportunity for children and parents, concerning awareness and self-defense strategies, instilling confidence and reducing the possibility of adverse physical control and/or harm. It addresses the need in the community to make our children more aware of their surroundings, how to protect themselves in potentially compromising situations, together with general safety tips to empower children not to become victims. Ofc. Manny Gonzalez, the school resource officer for

Aventura Charter School and Ofc. Olga De La Torre of the Aventura Community Policing Unit are certified instructors, who together with the assistance of Betty Helms guided the children through this process which culminated with a simulation session which reinforces the skills and knowledge the children developed during the Program.

Aventura Officers Honored

The Aventura Police Department recently hosted their 7th Anniversary and Awards Ceremony at The Fairmont Turnberry Isle Resort & Club to recognize Officer of the Year Troy Vezina and Civilian Employee of the Year Anna Howell, who had been selected by a vote of their peers.

Anna Howell, Crime Scene Tech, was selected for this honor based on her high level of professionalism and knowledge in her capacity with the Department, as well as being responsible for setting up and maintaining the Police Department's Property Room. Recognizing a rash of burglaries the City had been experiencing, Howell recommended that a processing of all vehicle burglaries should occur. By doing so, she was able to lift latents that helped investigators track down subjects involved, thereby assisting in the arrest of seven suspects involved in numerous vehicle burglaries.

While traveling on I-95, Officer Vezina observed a motor vehicle with fire and heavy



smoke emanating from it. Despite the close proximity of flames, Vezina entered the vehicle and located the driver. After carrying her to a safe location, he began first-responder responsibilities and was able to obtain a faint pulse. Subsequently, the victim was transported to the hospital and Vezina was treated at the scene for severe smoke inhalation. The Hollywood Fire Department later contacted the Aventura Police Department and advised the driver narrowly escaped fatal injuries since the vehicle became totally engulfed in flames shortly after she was rescued by Vezina.

In addition to earning the Officer of the Year award, Vezina was a recipient of the LEO Award in the category of Specialized Services, as well as the Medal of Valor, presented by the Law Enforcement Officers Foundation at a recent Awards Gala at the JW Marriott. Officer Elricco Barnes was also a recipient of the prestigious LEO Award in the Uniform Services category. Other Aventura officers who were LEO Award finalists include Ernie Long, Crime Prevention; and Ray Roman, Investigative Services. ♻️

Local Flooding Facts

Flooding is an act of nature that respects no boundary lines. In the City of Aventura, flooding is generally caused by heavy rainfall that occurs in short periods of time, as is common during summer thunderstorms, tropical storms and hurricanes. The City is vulnerable to flooding from storm water runoff and coastal storm surges. Due to this flood risk, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has designated most of the City as a Special Flood Hazard Area on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). This map designates areas susceptible to the 100-year flood and for safety purposes, establishes minimum elevations for construction.

A 100-year flood is the equivalent of 10 or more inches of rain within 24 hours. A 100-year flood has a 1% chance of occurring in any given year. However, it can occur more than once in a given year or in successive years. The potential for loss and damage in the City of Aventura during a heavy storm or hurricane does exist. Residents and property owners should be aware of this potential risk and be prepared to deal with flooding when it occurs.

FLOODPLAINS ARE ESSENTIAL

Although flooding is a nuisance, floodplains are an essential part of the natural cycle in South Florida. The Everglades, which is one expansive floodplain, and the Biscayne Aquifer which lies underneath, are South Florida's only source of drinking water. They need large quantities of water to be replenished. Occasional floods are, and always have been, essential sources of fresh water to replenish the Biscayne Aquifer.

FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS

Developers wishing to build in designated floodplain areas (including the City of Aventura) must use proper design techniques and structural requirements to ensure that new developments are flood proof. City officials must review all new developments in the City of Aventura to ensure the designs meet the City's Floodplain Development Regulations in order to receive a permit for construction.

The City has adopted Floodplain Development Regulations that require that all new construction have a lowest floor elevation 12" above the base flood elevation or 18" above the crown of the road, whichever is highest.

Before beginning a project, check with the Community Development Department for all codes and regulations that apply to your property.

SPECIAL FLOOD HAZARD AREA DISCLOSURE

It is a requirement in Miami-Dade County that any purchase of improved real estate located in a Special Flood Hazard Area or Coastal Flood Hazard Area include a full disclosure to the buyer that the property lies in either of those zones. This requirement alerts potential buyers to the threat of flooding in the area, so they can make an informed purchasing decision.

IMPROVEMENTS TO PROPERTY IN FLOOD HAZARD AREAS

For properties located in Special Flood Hazard Areas, it is required that improvements to properties be done in a manner which meets the current Floodplain Development Regulations. This requirement applies to:

- > Any structure which has incurred damage estimated at more than 50% of its market value
- > Any structure where improvements are planned where the cost of improvements is more than 50% of its market value
- > Any combination of the above two


FLOOD PROTECTION METHODS

When constructing a new or improved structure in a floodplain area, any combination of these methods may be employed to reduce the flooding potential. These methods must be approved by the City, and must not negatively impact surrounding properties.

> **Relocation:** Perhaps the only technique for completely preventing future flood damage. This method involves moving a house out of a flood area to a new location where there is no threat of flooding.

> **Elevation:** This method consists of raising a house on an elevated support structure to place it above future floodwaters.

> **Levees:** Also known as a berm, this is a method of creating a barrier of compacted soil to keep the water away from a property.

Floodwalls: Similar to a levee, floodwalls are designed to keep the water away from the house but are constructed of permanent materials such as concrete.

> **Closures:** Used in conjunction with other techniques such as floodwalls and levees, closures provide protection for gaps that are open for frequent usage such as sidewalks and driveways.

FLOOD MITIGATION STEPS

Even if you are not doing major improvements to your property, there are steps you can take to make your property more flood-proof, including:

> Grading your property to facilitate stormwater run-off

> Elevating major appliances such as air-conditioning units and water heaters to prevent damage during flooding

> Using flood-proofing materials such as paints and sealants

> Checking sewer trap valves to prevent backup flooding

> Cleaning gutters and storm drains around your property to permit free flow of water

> Keeping a stockpile of sandbags and construction materials available

FLOOD INSURANCE

One of the best ways to protect your investment is to insure it. Standard homeowners insurance and windstorm policies **DO NOT** cover losses from flooding (rising waters)! The Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 requires the purchase of flood insurance as a condition of receiving any federally related loan for purchase or construction of any building or mobile home located in any Special Flood Hazard Area.

The City of Aventura is a participant in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which is administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Federally guaranteed flood insurance is

available to City residents in AE Flood Zones at a discount of 10% because of the City's participation. NFIP policies are sold through licensed insurance agents and companies. You should buy flood insurance before the storm season, as there is a 30-day waiting period before coverage takes effect.

Federal flood insurance can protect homes, businesses and belongings from damage caused by flooding, including:

> **Structural elements:** such as walls, floors, equipment and fixtures.

> **Contents:** such as furniture, appliances and carpeting

> **Personal items:** such as clothing, stereos and televisions

You do not have to live in a special flood hazard area or a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) designated flood zone to purchase flood insurance. In fact, if you live in a low-risk area, you may be eligible for a low-cost preferred risk policy.

Even if you rent, do not have a mortgage or do not live in a Special Flood Hazard Area, you should still purchase flood insurance!

FLOOD WARNINGS

The Miami-Dade Office of Emergency Management and the National Weather Service issue flood, hurricane and severe weather warnings.

In the case of a hurricane, an Evacuation Order will be given by the Mayor of Miami-Dade County and will be broadcast on local TV and radio stations. The City of Aventura is located in an Evacuation Zone for any storm of Category 2 force or greater. This means all residents are required to leave the City when an Evacuation Order for a Category 2 storm is given. Aventura condominiums and property managers will also be notified of the Evacuation Order by a fax from the Office of the City Manager.

Residents should stay tuned to the local TV and radio stations for updates on storms, and should evacuate as soon as an Evacuation Order is issued.

FLOOD SAFETY TIPS

These are important tips you can follow when flooding threatens, whether you are staying in your home or evacuating.

> **Before the Flood:** Learn and practice the safest route from your home or business to high ground in case you must evacuate.

> Listen to local news for Evacuation Orders and shelter openings. Evacuate immediately once an order is given.

Turn off water, gas and electric service to your home and plug drains with large corks to prevent sewer backup.

> Keep a disaster kit on hand with a portable radio, flashlight, and emergency cooking equipment, drinking water, batteries, first aid supplies, money, canned foods and sturdy shoes.

> Develop and practice an emergency communication plan with your family. Designate an out-of-state friend or relative to serve as the "family contact."

> Fill your car with gas and move it to the highest point on your property.

> Flood-proof your home by utilizing the improvement and mitigation steps outlined in this pamphlet.

> Buy flood insurance to cover the value of your home and its contents.

> Take pictures or videos of your home and valuables and keep them in a safe, dry place with your insurance policy.

> **During the Flood:** Keep a battery-powered radio tuned to a local station for emergency information. Follow instructions for your area.

> Elevate valuables or move them to higher floors.

> Do not drive, walk or play in flooded areas. Strong currents, broken objects, wild animals and raw sewage pose serious health and safety threats. Wear sturdy shoes.

> Stay away from downed power lines. A downed power line in a puddle of water may electrify the entire puddle.

> **After the Flood:** Before entering a building, check for structural damage.

> Inspect for fire, electrical or gas hazards and submerged appliances BEFORE turning utilities back on.

> If you smell gas in or around your home, call your utility supplier immediately.

> Use tapwater for consumption only if it has been declared safe by officials. Use bottled water instead.

> Dispose of everything, including food, that has come in contact with flood waters. The flood waters could be contaminated with raw sewage and poisonous chemicals.

FLOOD ZONE INFORMATION

Local flood zone information is located at the Northeast (Aventura) Branch of the Miami-Dade Public Library and at the City of Aventura's Community Development Department. The Community Development Department can provide you with detailed information from the Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) including:

> Whether your property is located in a Special Flood Hazard Area

The community number
The panel number and suffix
The date of the FIRM's index
The FIRM zone
The base flood elevation

> For surveyors, architects and engineers, the City has the latest form of elevation certificates available to you for completion.

> For lenders, insurance agents and real estate agents, elevation certificates are kept on file for all buildings permitted by the City.

PLAN FOR THE STORM... NOW!

Hurricane season is once again upon us and it's important to plan now in order to be prepared should a storm threaten the South Florida area. Here are some tips to consider when making your plan:

1. All storms should be considered dangerous. Keep in mind that Hurricane Isabel was a category 2 storm when it struck the east coast last year and caused more than 3 billion dollars in damage and was responsible for 17 deaths. Just a few years ago, a sub-tropical system caused flooded streets, downed trees and a short-term loss of power.

2. Aventura is in an evacuation zone for a Category 2 hurricane or higher. If you're going to leave, leave early! You should be at your destination before tropical storm force winds arrive and they can arrive as much as 36 hours prior to the main force of the storm.

3. Stay tuned to the local media. They will keep you posted on the latest developments relating to the storm, including what plans are being implemented. The local media will advise which shelters are opening and when. Keep in mind that not all shelters open for all storms, or open at the same time.

4. Have supplies on hand. This includes food, water, prescriptions, and batteries for radios and flashlights. A list of recommended items is available in special hurricane publications available at most food or home improvement stores, or by calling the Aventura Police Department at 305-466-8989, ext. 8163.

5. Shelters for Persons with Special Needs: The Miami Dade Office of Emergency Management has designated certain facilities as Special Needs Evacuation Shelters. They are staffed with trained medical personnel to provide additional assistance and care that is not available at general population shelters. In order to be admitted to a Special Needs Shelter, a person must register with the Office of Emergency Management in advance. A person may register by calling 305-468-5900 and asking for an application; or they may download an application at http://www.co.miami-dade.fl.us/oem/hurricane/EEAP_program.asp.

For more information, you may call the Miami Dade Office of Emergency Management Answer Line at 305-468-5900; or the Aventura Police Department at 305-466-8989, ext. 8163. Should a storm threaten the South Florida area, stay tuned to the City of Aventura television and radio stations for more information. 📺
