Hurricane Preparation is Everyone's Responsibility

Residents of Florida shouldn't need to be reminded that Hurricane Season began June 1st. That date should serve as signal to everyone that it's time to prepare for what the tropics might bring our way in the months ahead. The first step is to prepare a plan. Use this plan to prepare in advance. Instead of trying to do everything at once when you realize the next storm that's out there just might strike this area.

Although last year was a relatively quiet hurricane season, the experts are predicting a busy hurricane season this year. Each time a hurricane poses a threat to the South Florida area, the Aventura Government Center and Police Department as well as the Miami Dade Office of Emergency Management are inundated with phone calls from residents asking questions as to what they should do or where they should go. Making plans and preparations in advance will relieve much of the anxiety.

Some basic supplies to have on hand:

- > Water – One gallon per person per day
- > Food – Long shelf life; comfort foods that are familiar. Don't forget a manual can opener.
- > First Aid Supplies – Bandages, antibacterial cream, latex gloves

> Clothing & Bedding – Pack a few changes of clothing and bedding in case you need to evacuate. Virtually all of Aventura evacuates for a Category 2 or higher Hurricane.

> Tools & Emergency Equipment – Flashlights, batteries, portable radio, TV, fire extinguisher, plastic containers, matches, plastic sheeting

> Special Requirements – For infants: formula, diapers, bottles, powdered milk, medications. For adults: Heart and high blood pressure medication, Insulin, prescription drugs, denture needs, contact lenses and supplies, extra eye glasses

> Entertainment for family members based on age: books, games (cards), portable music devices.

> Store important papers in waterproof containers (Will, insurance policies, contracts deeds, stocks and bonds; passports, social security cards, immunization records; Bank and credit card account numbers

Your best defense is to be prepared and to have a plan whether you need to evacuate or not. Being prepared helps you and your family after the storm during recovery efforts.

RECIPIENT**
Officer Joseph Craig



Officer Craig won the LEO Officer of the Year Award in our division for saving the life of a man who could not breathe due to injuries suffered in a vehicle crash. On April 19, 2006, Officer Craig came upon the scene of an accident located at I-75 and N.W. 186th Street. The vehicle was sitting in the middle of the roadway. As Officer Craig ran through traffic he noticed a man slumped over the steering wheel who was not breathing and had no pulse. Officer Craig was able to move and stabilize the victim which cleared his airway and enabled him to breath. With the victim still trapped within the vehicle, Officer Craig advised Fire Rescue of the equipment needed to extricate him from the vehicle. While waiting for Fire Rescue to arrive, Officer Craig continued to aid the victim and repeatedly kept his airway free. Officer Craig remained on the scene after fire rescue arrived and assisted with the entire rescue effort. The victim was freed, stabilized and transported to Jackson Memorial Hospital. All fire rescue personnel strongly believe that the efforts of Officer Craig were the reason the victim survived. Officer Craig displayed professionalism, courage and life saving actions in a prompt and effective manner.

The Aventura Police Department will gladly provide a presentation on hurricane preparations to your homeowner’s association, civic organization or business. For more information call the Aventura Police Department at 305-466-8989, ext. #8163. You can also call the Miami-Dade Answer Line at 3-1-1 for more details on evacuation and hurricane preparations. In the event of an approaching storm, it is important to monitor to local media including City of Aventura TV (AVTV – Comcast Ch 77) and our Information Radio on 1650AM.

HOW WILL I KNOW WHEN TO EVACUATE?

The local media is the best source of information. The County Mayor’s Office and Office of Emergency Management maintains close communication with the National Hurricane Center and will make the decision if an evacuation should be ordered or not. If an evacuation is ordered, the media will also report which shelters are going to open

and the time they will be opening. Pay close attention to the media for shelter openings as not all shelters open at the same time or for all storms!

WHAT IF I REQUIRE A SPECIAL NEEDS SHELTER?

People who have special medical conditions where they need a higher degree of care must register in advance with the Miami Dade Office of Emergency Management. For an application, call 305-468-5900. Again, the time to do this is now, not when the storm is heading this way.

2006 Police Officer of the Year and Police Employee of the Year

OFFICER ROBERT FEIERSTADT

Officer Feierstadt won the officer of the year award for saving the life of a child that was not breathing. On November 30th, 2006, Officer Feierstadt stopped a speeding vehicle while conducting traffic enforcement along the William Lehman Causeway. As Officer Feierstadt made contact with the driver he observed that the driver was in panic and shouting that his son was dying. The man explained that he was attempting to find a hospital as he pointed to his toddler son. Officer Feierstadt immediately noticed that the child was blue in color and lifeless. Officer Feierstadt determined that the child was not breathing and began life saving measures. He began clearing the child's airway and Infant CPR as he requested emergency assistance from Metro-Dade Fire Rescue. Due to Officer Feierstadt's efforts the child began to breathe on his own by the time Fire Rescue arrived at the scene. The child was transported to Joe DiMaggio Children's Hospital and was expected to make a full recovery.

LINDA FREEMAN

Linda Freeman won the civilian of the year award for her assistance during our CALEA re-accreditation. In January 2006, the Aventura Police Department went through an onsite review by representatives of the Commission for the Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA). For the onsite review, assessors examined 446 standards, met with the members of the Agency and gathered public input. The Assessment team agreed on a favorable recommendation to the Commission and expressed high praise for the department. This was accomplished in part by the outstanding efforts and dedication of Linda Freeman. Ms. Freeman worked tirelessly in the months leading up to the onsite review, working six or even seven days a week and late hours. Ms. Freeman was instrumental in organizing the panel presentation keeping the onsite review running smoothly. Ms. Freeman always handled her task in a cheerful and professional manner. Linda's hard work and dedication during the process, allowed us to complete all of our required activities in a timely manner. Linda Freeman's name will be the first added to a special plaque created in the memory of Phil Hershey to honor the civilian of the year.

ACES Goes on Key West Field Trip



Students excitedly gathered bright and early at ACES dressed in colorful bathing suits, sunglasses and sandals in anticipation of the upcoming Key West Field Trip. As they boarded the bus, a Marine Biology Instructor captivated students with stories on the history of the Keys and ocean life that they would encounter later that day. Later that afternoon, students met, pet and fed a small family of dolphins. The following morning, students woke at the break of dawn, stumbled down for a hearty breakfast and headed out to John Pennekamp Coral Reef State Park. Students checked out their gear and

HURRICANE SHUTTER PERMITS



As we prepare ourselves for hurricane season, we think about getting the additional protection found in shutters. Be sure to start the process as soon as possible due to the high demand on these permits.

Reliable contractors are hard to find so verify that your contractor is licensed with the State of Florida or Miami Dade County. You can do this by contacting Miami Dade County directly or your local Building Department at (305) 466-8937.

For your reference, below are the requirements needed to be able to pull a shutter permit in the City of Aventura. Please inform your contractor on these updated requirements.

Please submit two (2) sets of the following with the Building Permit Application:

- 1) Site specific calculations signed and sealed by a Florida Professional Engineer.
- 2) Sketch of floor plan showing building measurements and height, indicating distances from the corners of the building.
- 3) Schedule of shutters with opening measures.
- 4) Notice of Acceptance MUST be marked accordingly and must be submitted on 11x17 paper.
- 5) Signed Contract between owner and contractor.
- 6) Authorization Letters from Manufacturer and Condo Association.
- 7) Special Inspector Form signed and sealed. 🐬

Local Flooding Facts

Flooding is an act of nature that respects no boundary lines. In the City of Aventura, flooding is generally caused by heavy rainfall that occurs in short periods of time, as is common during summer thunderstorms, tropical storms and hurricanes. The City is vulnerable to flooding from storm water runoff and coastal storm surges. Due to this flood risk, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has designated most of the City as a Special Flood Hazard Area on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). This map designates areas susceptible to the 100-year flood and for safety purposes, establishes minimum elevations for construction.

A 100-year flood is the equivalent of 10 or more inches of rain within 24 hours. A 100-year flood has a 1% chance of occurring in any given year. However, it can occur more than once in a given year or in successive years. The potential for loss and damage in the City of Aventura during a heavy storm or hurricane does exist. Residents and property owners should be aware of this potential risk and be prepared to deal with flooding when it occurs.

FLOODPLAINS ARE ESSENTIAL

Although flooding is a nuisance, floodplains are an essential part of the natural cycle in South Florida. The Everglades, which is one expansive floodplain, and the Biscayne Aquifer which lies underneath, are South Florida's only source of drinking water. They need large quantities of water to be replenished. Occasional floods are, and always have been, essential sources of fresh water to replenish the Biscayne Aquifer.

FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS

Developers wishing to build in designated floodplain areas (including the City of Aventura) must use proper design techniques and structural requirements to ensure that new developments are flood proof. City officials must review all new developments in the City of Aventura to ensure the designs meet the City's Floodplain Development Regulations in order to receive a permit for construction. The City has adopted Floodplain Development Regulations that require that all new construction have a lowest floor elevation 12" above the base flood elevation or 18" above the crown of the road, whichever is highest.

Before beginning a project, check with the Community Development Department for all codes and regulations that apply to your property.

SPECIAL FLOOD HAZARD AREA DISCLOSURE

It is a requirement in Miami-Dade County that any purchase of improved real estate located in a Special Flood Hazard Area or Coastal Flood

Hazard Area include a full disclosure to the buyer that the property lies in either of those zones. This requirement alerts potential buyers to the threat of flooding in the area, so they can make an informed purchasing decision.

IMPROVEMENTS TO PROPERTY IN FLOOD HAZARD AREAS

For properties located in Special Flood Hazard Areas, it is required that improvements to properties be done in a manner which meets the current Floodplain Development Regulations. This requirement applies to:

- > Any structure which has incurred damage estimated at more than 50% of its market value
- > Any structure where improvements are planned where the cost of improvements is more than 50% of its market value
- > Any combination of the above two

FLOOD PROTECTION METHODS

When constructing a new or improved structure in a floodplain area, any combination of these methods may be employed to reduce the flooding potential. These methods must be approved by the City, and must not negatively impact surrounding properties.

> **Relocation:** Perhaps the only technique for completely preventing future flood damage. This method involves moving a house out of a flood area to a new location where there is no threat of flooding.

> **Elevation:** This method consists of raising a house on an elevated support structure to place it above future floodwaters.

> **Levees:** Also known as a berm, this is a method of creating a barrier of compacted soil to keep the water away from a property.

> **Floodwalls:** Similar to a levee, floodwalls are designed to keep the water away from the house but are constructed of permanent materials such as concrete.



> **Closures:** Used in conjunction with other techniques such as floodwalls and levees, closures provide protection for gaps that are open for frequent usage such as sidewalks and driveways.

FLOOD MITIGATION STEPS

Even if you are not doing major improvements to your property, there are steps you can take to make your property more flood-proof, including:

- > Grading your property to facilitate stormwater run-off
- > Elevating major appliances such as air-conditioning units and water heaters to prevent damage during flooding
- > Using flood-proofing materials such as paints and sealants
- > Checking sewer trap valves to prevent backup flooding
- > Cleaning gutters and storm drains around your property to permit free flow of water
- > Keeping a stockpile of sandbags and construction materials available

FLOOD INSURANCE

One of the best ways to protect your investment is to insure it. **Standard homeowners insurance and windstorm policies DO NOT cover losses from flooding (rising waters)!** The Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 requires the purchase of flood insurance as a condition of receiving any federally related loan for purchase or construction of any building or mobile home located in any Special Flood Hazard Area.

The City of Aventura is a participant in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which is administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Federally guaranteed flood insurance is available to City residents in AE Flood Zones at a discount of 10% because of the City's

participation. NFIP policies are sold through licensed insurance agents and companies. You should buy flood insurance before the storm season, as there is a 30-day waiting period before coverage takes effect.

Federal flood insurance can protect homes, businesses and belongings from damage caused by flooding, including:

- > **Structural Elements:** such as walls, floors, equipment and fixtures.
- > **Contents:** such as furniture, appliances and carpeting
- > **Personal items:** such as clothing, stereos and televisions

You do not have to live in a special flood hazard area or a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) designated flood zone to purchase flood insurance. In fact, if you live in a low-risk area, you may be eligible for a low-cost preferred risk policy. Even if you rent, do not have a mortgage or do not live in a Special Flood Hazard Area, you should still purchase flood insurance!

FLOOD WARNINGS

The Miami-Dade Office of Emergency Management and the National Weather Service issue flood, hurricane and severe weather warnings.

In the case of a hurricane, an Evacuation Order will be given by the Mayor of Miami-Dade County and will be broadcast on local TV and radio stations. **The City of Aventura is located in an Evacuation Zone for any storm of Category 2 force or greater.** This means all residents are required to leave the City when an Evacuation Order for a Category 2 storm is given. Aventura condominiums and property managers will also be notified of the Evacuation Order by a fax from the Office of the City Manager.

Residents should stay tuned to the local TV and radio stations for updates on storms, and should evacuate as soon as an Evacuation Order is issued.

FLOOD SAFETY TIPS

These are important tips you can follow when flooding threatens, whether you are staying in your home or evacuating.

Before the Flood:

- > Learn and practice the safest route from your home or business to high ground in case you must evacuate.
- > Listen to local news for Evacuation Orders and shelter openings. Evacuate immediately once an order is given.
- > Turn off water, gas and electric service to your home and plug drains with large corks to prevent sewer backup.
- > Keep a disaster kit on hand with a portable radio, flashlight, and emergency cooking equipment, drinking water, batteries, first aid supplies, money, canned foods and sturdy shoes.
- > Develop and practice an emergency communication plan with your family. Designate an out-of-state friend or relative to serve as the “family contact.”
- > Fill your car with gas and move it to the highest point on your property.
- > Flood-proof your home by utilizing the improvement and mitigation steps outlined in this article.
- > Buy flood insurance to cover the value of your home and its contents.
- > Take pictures or videos of your home and valuables and keep them in a safe, dry place with your insurance policy.

During the Flood:

- > Keep a battery-powered radio tuned to a local station for emergency information. Follow instructions for your area.
- > Elevate valuables or move them to higher floors.
- > Do not drive, walk or play in flooded areas. Strong currents, broken objects, wild animals and raw sewage pose serious health and safety threats. Wear sturdy shoes.
- > Stay away from downed power lines. A downed power line in a puddle of water may electrify the entire puddle.

After the Flood:

- > Before entering a building, check for structural damage.
- > Inspect for fire, electrical or gas hazards and submerged appliances **before** turning utilities back on.
- > If you smell gas in or around your home, call your utility supplier immediately.
- > Use bottled water **only**, until tapwater has been declared safe for consumption by officials.
- > Dispose of everything, including food, that has come in contact with flood waters. The flood waters could be contaminated with raw sewage and poisonous chemicals.

FLOOD ZONE INFORMATION

Local flood zone information is located at the Northeast (Aventura) Branch of the Miami-Dade Public Library and at the City of Aventura's Community Development Department. The Community Development Department can provide you with detailed information from the Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) including:

- > Whether your property is located in a Special Flood Hazard Area
- > The community number
- > The panel number and suffix
- > The date of the FIRM's index
- > The FIRM zone
- > The base flood elevation

For surveyors, architects and engineers, the City has the latest form of elevation certificates available to you for completion.

For lenders, insurance agents and real estate agents, elevation certificates are kept on file for all buildings permitted by the City.

For more information, or to receive a Flood Insurance Rate Map determination for your property, contact the Community Development Department at (305) 466-8940.
